## 20 years of the KHVC - Derek Holloway

The Knighton Historic Vehicle Club was born from a chance meeting between Derek Holloway and Tim Frost. Derek had lived and worked in the motor trade all his life and was well known in the Borders for his sales and rallying skills back in the sixties and seventies, together with an interest in classic cars, particularly Fords. Tim was born in Surrey and prior to retiring to Bishops Castle in 1998 had been living and working in Buckinghamshire for 25yrs. He has had a life-long interest in cars and motor sport in general and classic cars in particular, having had two in his garage since 1974.

Not long before they met, both Tim and Derek became interested in the restoration of classic interior trim. Tim having arrived in Shropshire the owner of a Gilbert and a 30's Standard 10, was looking for a club to join and initially joined a large club in Shrewsbury. Derek was already a member and was advertising his interior trim services in the club magazine. Tim phoned Derek. They met for a chat and decided have a go at founding their own club.

In April 1999, the first meeting took place in the Knighton Hotel. During the summer months, meetings continued on the last Thursday of the month with some very good noggins and natters (not all about cars), visits to local shows including Kington Vintage Show, Knighton Carnival and Bishops Castle Michaelmas Fair. Our inaugural newsletter was published in August of that year.

The year ended with a small dinner at the Sun Inn Clun, which was very successful. It was recorded in the newsletter of the time, "Let's hope we can make this an annual club event". This has happened with some very enjoyable dinners on some occasions nearly sixty people attended.

The club struggled through the first winter. On one evening only Derek and Tim turned up. In May 2000, we organised the Elan Valley tour. We had twenty three entries and the fee was £5 including twelve months membership. This boosted our numbers to about thirty.


We also started our summer pub meets, the first being at the Kangaroo, Aston on Clun which was well attended. Since then the club has gone from strength to strength. Towards the end of 2000 it was suggested that as the club was growing, we should have members responsible for certain duties.

As a result an extraordinary general meeting was held on the 25th January 2001. The main item on the agenda was on forming a committee. The meeting was in favour. A committee was formed consisting of the following people.

It was agreed that committee meetings be open to any member who wished to attend and join in the debate, to avoid the club having an inner circle which often happens in some clubs.

The first committee meeting took place on February 8th 2001. The main item on the agenda was the club insurance and the importance of public liability. Also discussed was the drawing up of a set of rules and a constitution. This was done by Mike Williams and Derek Holloway. The first events dairy was also drawn up, with 34 events in the calendar, though not all were club events. All in all, 2001 was a big turning point for the club which set on the road for the future.



In the May newsletter it was reported that with regret that we had to cancel our Lake Vyrnwy classic tour due to the outbreak of foot and mouth disease in our area which had catastrophic effects on the countryside life. A lot of events had to be cancelled. Nevertheless, we still managed our classic summer evenings for a noggin and natter and we still had club stands at, Kington and Knighton shows, and Bishops Castle Michaelmas Fair. Our BBQ at Plough Cottage, Leintwardine, with autojumble and tombola, was well attended. We also managed our Wye Valley/ Epynt classic tour. We finished the year with our Christmas dinner at the Norton Manor Hotel.

2002 started with a successful AGM on January 31st. Peter Medlicott was chairman at the time. With Peter's help we were able to produce our newsletter as he did all the photocopying free of charges for several years. On one occasion we had 600 copies! Our bank balance was a mere £338.07p. The biggest item on the agenda was the cub subscription. It was suggested by Peter Gilbert that the membership fee be raised from £5 to £10. After discussion the result of the vote was 9 for 1 against and 1 abstention.

This event was the start of our annual show which is now held at Secret Hills Discovery Centre, Craven Arms. We finished the year with our Christmas dinner at Mellington Hall, with 30 members enjoying a very good evening.
